WINCHESTER WELCOMES L'HERMIONE, LAFAYETTE

The Winchester Jumelage Association was happy to have a rôle to play in the glorious visit of L'Hermione, an authentic replica of the sailing ship that carried the Marquis de Lafayette from Rochefort, France, to Boston in 1780. The celebrated Frenchman returned in the middle of our Revolutionary War with secret information for his commanding officer George Washington that France was going to send soldiers and part of its navy to aid the American cause in that conflict. French military help was, in the end, decisive in securing our independence from Great Britain.

Reconstruction of L'Hermione began in 1997 in Rochefort. Many Jumelage members recall their visit to the half-finished ship in 2004, and they turned out in force on an exceptionally hot July weekend to go aboard during her 2-day port call, standing in line for up to three hours at Rowe's Wharf in Boston Harbor.

Jumelage played another important rôle in this historic visit. In conjunction with L'Hermione's tour of the east coast, French historian Guy Gautreau, with his wife Marie, gave lectures at the ship's ports-of-call about the history and significance of both the original voyage and the reconstruction and re-enactment of it. M. Gautreau is the Administrator-Lecturer of the Hermione/Lafayette Association. During their Boston visit, M. et Mme. Gautreau were hosted by Al and Judie Muggia, and fêted at John McConnell's Bastille Day celebration.

ABOUT OUR TWIN CITY

Large, beautiful and affluent, Saint-Germain-en-Laye is situated on high bluffs overlooking the Seine River downstream from Paris. It is home to a large Château (castle) in which the future king Louis XIV was born in 1638, the same year Winchester was founded. The famous formal Terrasse, by reknowned landscape architect André LeNôtre stretches from the Château along the heights north to the huge Forest of Saint-Germain. The city has easy subway (RER) access to Paris. Other famous people born here include composer Claude Debussy and French King Henri II. Saint-Germain is also home to

the national champion football (soccer) team Paris Saint-Germain (PSG). Louis XIV's cradle is in city and team logos.
