## THE ANNIVERSARY YEAR THAT WASN'T

umelage members in Winchester and Saint-Germain-en-Laye shared two things in 2020: being frustrated and confined by the gobal Coronavirus pandemic that defined the entire year, and the effort to celebrate what should have been the glorious 30-year history of our Twin City relationship. As the dark year came to a close, we looked back on all that might have been, vowing that our celebrations would be revived and amplified as soon as circumstances allowed. We now look forward to a resumption of all the typical activities that define our annual commitment to our values of international friendship and discovery.

In these pages we will look back on the last few years and relive some of the memories and happiness that our fruitful association brought us. Chief among these are the annual fall trips, alternating between France and the United States, which bring together friends from both countries in discovery and enjoyment. Reents years have seen joint trips centered on Lyon and on the lower Loire River Valley in France, and on Virginia and the Brandywine Valley in the United States. The 2020 trip was to have been based in the Paris region and Saint-Germain-en-Laye, with excursions to points of interest a bit

farther afield. This was, of course, not possible in the end, and our French friends are now planning a future trip centered in Provence. Our next American adventure is being planned around using Winchester and Boston as a home base for discovering southeastern New England.

Our student exchange program was likewise canceled this past summer. As of this writing we have no idea when free travel will be possible again, as the pandemic recedes and normal activity resumes. Our local Winchester slate of activities --- dinner parties, Town Day, Bastille Day, Farmers Market International Day, cultural exchanges, etc. --- were likewise not possible. Our Board of Directors continued to meet regularly, if remotely, by Zoom conference, as did our Joint French and American Board.

On the following pages, you will find a review of many of the pleasurable moments and times we shared over the course of the past few years, moments that we look forward to reviving with great enthusiasm!

## MAGNIFICENT TRAVELS ABROAD AND AT HOME

One of the highlights of every year (but 2020) for Jumelage members and guests id the annual joint trip, which gathers French and American friends in an area of great interest for tourists, alternating between France and the United States. Our last two of these took groups of around 45 or so to the city of Saumur and the surrounding lower Loire River Valley in France (2018), and the Brandywine Valley region around the city of Wilmington, Delaware, and southeastern Pennsylvania (2019.)

#### SAUMUR and the LOWER LOIRE VALLEY

Forty-three travellers assembled in early October 2018 in Saint-Germain-en-Laye for a 8-day adventure in the beautiful Anjou region of the lower Loire River, with a headquarters in the ancient city of Saumur, headquarters of the French cavalry and riding school, and capital of one of France's most noted wine producing regions.

These days saw visits to ancient medieval barns, abbeys, and châteaux. The group visited the Grange de Meslay, an enormous vaulted medieval storage barn which today hosts an international music fesital. The group visited the castles of Saumur, Brèze, Azay-le-Rideau, and Villandry.

Visits were made to museums of armored vehicles and mushroom-culture, as well as wine-bottling factories and the Combier Distillery. Part of one sunny day was devoted to the Royal Abbey of Fontevraud on the border of Anjou, Touraine and Poitou. It remains still today as the largest monastic complex in France. Medieval villages were on the itinerary --- Candes-Saint-Martin, for example --- and the city of Angers, dominated by its immense ancient fortifications.

Memorable meals took place in ancient restaurants, old farms, and even in a candlelit cave. The final gala dinner, always a special treat, was held in the Caves Ackermann, a place for wine storage, as well as headquarters for the Saumur chapter of the Confrérie des Tastevins, an antique wine brotherhood. Four members of the group were inducted into the Fraternity. (There is a Boston chapter!)

Finally, a reception was held for the group in the Saumur City Hall by Jackie Goulte, the mayor of Saumur, and our own Arnaud Péricard, the mayor of Saint-Germain, as well as councillors and other officials. This was followed by the traditional joint meeting of the Boards of Directors of the Winchester and Saint-Germain branches of the Jumelage. Glasses of Loire Valley sparkling wine, accompanied by cries of "chin-chin" completed the formalities.

# BRANDYWINE VALLEY AND BEYOND

For the 2019 joint trip, it was Winchester's turn to host, and the focus this time was the region around northern Delaware and southeastern Pennsylvania, bisected by both the brandywine River and American History.

Home base was the elegant DuPont Hotel in Wilmington, from which many day excursions were planned. No visit to the region can ignore the historic DuPont family and their scientific and architectural accomplishments.

Accordingly, the trip started with visits to the historic gunpowder factory at which this French émigrée family made their first fortune. Te following decades saw them constantly inventing and patenting new chemicals and processes. The acquired wealth led to the construction of magnificant homes and French-styled châteaux and gardens in the region, a number of which were on the itinerary. Both Hagley and Nemours were among these grand homes.

The area is rich with art museums, and many were on the tour, Especially the Delaware Museum of Art, the Brandywine Museum (withits famous collection of works by the three generations of the Wyeth family,) and the Barnes Foundation in Philadelphia. Several days saw visits to the Brandywine Battlefield of the Revolutionary War, a helicopter museum, polo matches, a day at Winterthur House museum and gardens, and an afternoon and evening at the famous Longwood Gardens, culminating the a spectacular display of illuminated fountains.

A day in Philadelphia included Independence Hall, the Barnes Foundation, and the world famous pipe organ at the former Wanamaker Department Store (now Macy's.) The tour ended with the traditional Gala Dinner, in the DuBarry Room of the DuPont Hotel.

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## SUMMER STUDENT EXCHANGE, BACK AND FORTH

Every summer, the Winchester Jumelage Association welcomes three young adult students from Saint-Germain for three weeks. They are placed with local businesses or community organizations, and spend the better part of each week working and getting through the day in English. Typically, some of them are studying political science and spend their time working in the office of our State Representative Michael Day. Others have worked at BookEnds, a local bookstore, at KidStock childrens theatre workshop, WrightLocke Farm, and other establishments.

Various activities are planned for our interns during their stay which, in the past, have included tours of the Museum of Fine Arts, boat cruises in Essex, walking tours of Harvard University, visits to the State House, and so forth. The interns are placed with Winchester families, who generally give generously of their time to take interns shopping and touring around Boston, New England and beyond.




